



End of Key Stage Standard Assessment Tests (SATs)

Year Two



Key Information

All papers must be sat by all children in May 2022.

The papers will be sat within a week, with no more than one test per day.

Children will take the tests in their classrooms, with their familiar adults.

They are not allowed to use any equipment e.g. cubes or calculators although they are allowed to do jotting, draw pictures, circle and/or highlight the texts.

Each test is allocated a suggested time allowance, but this is not strictly enforced.

Children are allowed a break during the test but may only sit each paper once.

Teachers may use their discretion to finish a test for a child/ren.

Teachers will not have seen the papers before the test.

Maths

Paper 1 – Arithmetic

- approximately 20 minutes.

Paper 2 – Reasoning

- approximately 35 minutes.

Questions can be read aloud to the children and some words can be explained.
Mathematical words and numbers cannot be read aloud or reworded.

Reading

Paper 1 - combined reading prompt and answer booklet
- approximately 30 minutes.

Paper 2 - reading booklet and reading answer booklet
- approximately 40 minutes.

Writing

No paper.

Assessments are drawn from children's work in class and recorded in books throughout the year.

Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar

Schools may choose to administer the optional KS1 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test and use the results to inform English writing TA judgements.

The spelling test takes approximately 15 minutes.

The grammar questions take approximately 20 minutes.

Science

No paper.

Assessments are drawn from children's work in class and recorded in books throughout the year.

A pupil who has completed the programme of study will be judged as either 'working at the expected standard' or 'has not met the expected standard'.

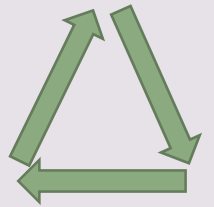
Marking

Tests are marked by the Year Two teachers, who are familiar with the children.

Raw scores are converted into scaled scores. These give us an indication of where the child is in relation to the government's expected score.

Teacher Moderation

Test scores are used as part of the teacher assessment. We also use our observations from within lesson time and the children's books and other written work.



SATs 'results' will be shared as part of the end of year report. You will be told whether your child was assessed to be

Working **Towards** the Year Two Standard,

Working **At** the **Expected** Standard

or Working with **Greater Depth**.

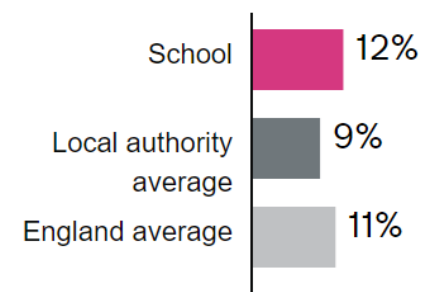

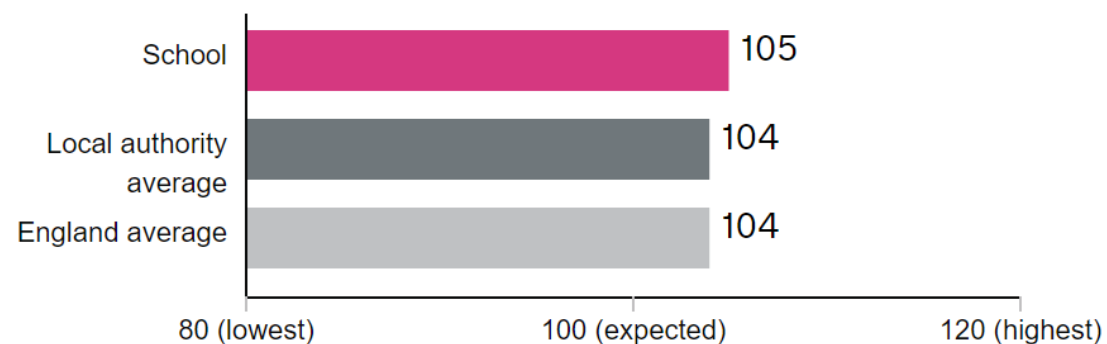
Pupils meeting expected standard in reading, writing and maths ?



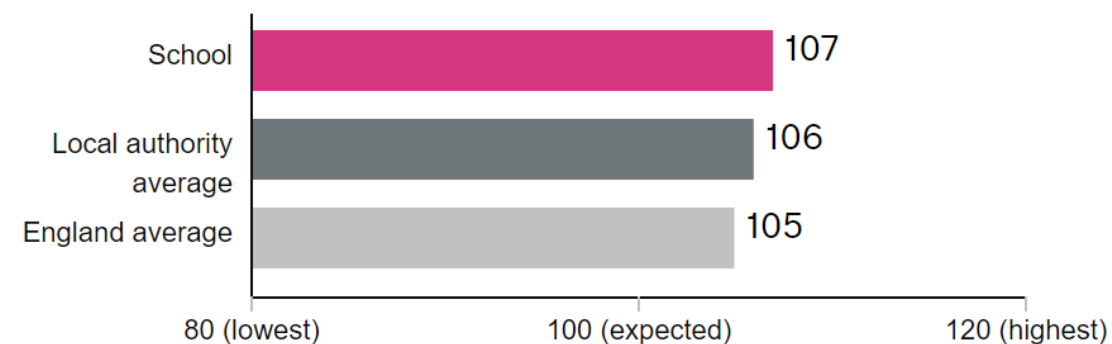
Pupils achieving at a higher standard in reading, writing and maths ?

Average score in maths ?

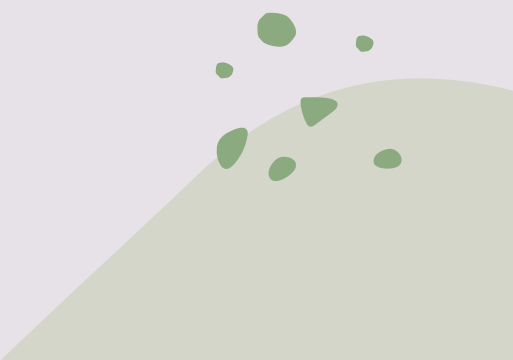

How You Can Support At Home

- make sure they have a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast!

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- practise 10, 2, 5, 3 times tables
 - practise recognising and using coins
 - practise telling the time on an analogue clock
 - practise spellings
 - read daily
 - ask children to summarise what they have read, in their own words
 - broaden vocabulary and discuss synonyms
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- stay calm!

FAQs

-What if my child misses a test?

Children can take the test another day.

All tests must be administered within the month of May but there is no set day.

-What are the results used for?

DfE does not publish school-level results for KS1.

It is used as the baseline for measuring progress between KS1 and KS2.
